Milford Sound and Puzzling World near Queenstown. The adrenaline-filled Jet Boat


adventure should not be missed either. Of course, the visit to New Zealand is


incomplete without getting a feel of the Maori cultural experience in Auckland and

Ms. Nina: You're welcome.



and this causes confusion and misunderstanding.



Thanksgiving Day. From now on, I probably will celebrate this festival every year because I realize that I have lots of people to send my gratitude to.



English Corner Activities 2017-2018










and Ms.Chu. A team of dedicated English ambassadors promoted and conducted the English Corner activities enthusiastically.

- 2. In a medium bowl, mix together the shortening, molasses, brown sugar, water, egg, and vanilla until smooth. Gradually stir in the dry ingredients, until they are completely absorbed. Divide dough into 3 pieces, pat down to 1 1/2 inch thickness, wrap in plastic wrap, and refrigerate for at least 3 hours.
- 1 inch apart onto an ungreased cookie sheet.
- 4. Bake for 10 to 12 minutes in the preheated oven. Remove from the baking sheet to cool on wire racks. When cool, the cookies can be frosted with the icing of your choice.











