Profile ~ a story of a local New-Territory kid from the ground to the sky!



Being an airlines' pilot is many people's dream, especially for teenagers. To cope with the theme of our newsletter this time, I have interviewed one of my high-school friends who is presently a veteran airliner's pilot for one of the local airlines. Tse Hing Siu, Jackie went to the same high school as me in Canada. Over these years, his enthusiasm in aviation drove him to keep challenging himself in one of the toughest jobs in the world. Jackie is now serving as a senior first officer and flies regularly with the world's most advanced commercial aircraft B747-400 and B777 and safely take passengers from all over the world to different places. The following interview will show you how the dream of a new-territory kid became true.

C: Cheung Fu Wah J: Jackie Tse

C: What did you think of being a pilot when you were young? J: When I was little, I lived in Yuen Long. To me, flying a big jet or being a pilot was certainly impossible. Compared with other foreigners, I thought it was difficult to enter the aviation industry and it was to be unachievable for a local-born teenager. Flying was only a dream to me at that time.

C: How did you finally become a pilot?

J: Although it was difficult to make this dream come true, I did not give up. After the achievement of my university degree in computer science and the private pilot license in Sydney, Australia, I returned to Hong Kong and applied for the local flight cadet program back in 1990. It took me a long time to finally get accepted because only a few numbers of candidates were chosen and sent to an aviation school located in Prestwick, Scotland, for a year and a half intensive flying training. After successfully completing the course and getting the pilot license, I returned to Hong Kong and started my career as a second officer. In order to keep my flying skills and professional license valid, a lot of 'checks' are given from time to time. However, I think those checks or examinations are important to enhance my professionalism because they drive me to be perfect. Keeping learning new things and being open-minded are imperative to those who fly. In fact, our slogan is, when you stop learning, you stop flying'. Indeed, being a pilot is a professional job in which a small error might turn to a big problem and affect the safety of passengers. Therefore, being precise is always required.

C: So, what are the most vital qualities needed by a pilot?

J: Being confident is the most important thing for a pilot. If you do not have confidence to know what you do, nothing can be done. On the contrary, being over-confident should be avoided because if you overestimate yourself, it would be easy to make mistakes that might affect others. Being mature is also necessary so that good-



decision skills can be fully practised. I truly believe that the aforementioned elements are valuable to assist me as a successful pilot.

C: What significant role does English play in your job?

J: It is no doubt that English is an international language

that is being used widely in an international aviation field. A good English command is definitely required. It is not only for the operation with the air traffic communication on a daily basis, but also for the urgency. Making an effective and meticulous decision is very crucial during a flight. Having a good command of English helps communicate with other crews from different countries on board. The way you presenting your ideas and convincing others certainly requires a good command of English. Thus, for those who want to be a pilot, I encourage them to learn English because it will be a basic tool for them to enter the field but also it will help them survive in a competitive world. Remember, there is no 'free lunch'. All you need to do is to try your best to achieve what you can achieve.

Everyone has own his/her dreams. Martin Luther King had said, 'I have a dream'. This famous quote has touched many people's


ENGLISH MORNING READING PERIOD

A 'Morning Reading Period' has been adopted since 2002 in our school. It helps cultivate student's reading habit through a twenty-minute session. From Monday to Friday, students can enjoy reading their own chosen materials in a quiet reading atmosphere on the campus every morning. In our Morning Reading Period, two months a year have been scheduled for English-reading activities. The purpose is to provide students with a greater opportunity to enhance their English capacity through reading.

In this section, we have conducted some special interviews with teachers to see what they say about this activity.

Answer: It is no doubt that the school wants the students to put more attention on English and provides the students with more opportunities to use English. As English is an international language, it is important for us to build up our vocabulary bank and create an English environment.

Q2: Do you have any suggestions of English books you will recommend us to read?

Answer: I think students should choose books that they like. However, I have also some suggestions. There is an English Magazine called CNN Interactive English Magazine. In this magazine, you can learn many different kinds of global topics in English and there is also a CD-ROM that you can listen to. One thing I want to emphasize is that there are many ways to improve English. For example, listen to the English program and songs all according to your interest. However, please make good use of your Mass Media.

Q3: As you have looked around so far, what do you think our school's student should improve?

Answer: Most of the students are doing very well. However, I think students should well prepare their English reading materials and work on their attitude too. They should set a task for themselves and give themselves a deadline. Overall, they should have a target and be well-prepared.

1. Do you think English reading month is good for students?

Of course! When students read more English books, they definitely learn more vocabulary and get more exposure to the English language.

2. When did you begin to read English books?

Since primary one. Since my school was an Anglo-Chinese one, we were asked to read a lot of English books from time to time. Since then I've cultivated an English reading habit.

3. Would you recommend any books to our students?

"The Diary of Anne Frank." It is about a thirteen-year-old Jewish girl, Anne Frank, who went into hiding for two years in a storeroom. It was written by herself during the Second World War. When she was 13 years old, her family fled Nazi Germany in fear of persecution. They went to Holland, where they hid for two years in a sealed-off back room of an Amsterdam office building. They were eventually betrayed and the family was taken to a Nazi concentration camp in Belsen, where Anne died. From Anne's diary, one could see that the girl was always striving to live up to her high expectations in life, despite the unusual circumstances.

4. Could you give some advice to our students on how to choose a suitable book? Choose a book that you like, that is, one that you find interesting. You'll keep reading it till the end. Remember to choose a book that suits you. Never force yourself to read a book that you find boring and difficult. Otherwise, you'll lose interest very soon. Once you've developed an interest in reading, you'd love to pick up an English book very often.

"I like reading both English and Chinese books. I think the English Morning Reading Month can effectively help students learn English. As long as students read more English books, it does not matter whether they choose simple English books".
